

#### **Center-Based Program**

The Douglass School Program serves children ages 3-21 diagnosed with an autism spectrum disorder. We utilize the evidence-based principles of Applied Behavior Analysis (ABA) to develop an individualized educational program that effectively addresses the complex support needs of our students.

This innovative program exemplifies GSAPP's staunch commitment to community engagement by partnering with urban, underserved school districts in New Jersey to offer high-quality services for children with autism. SHARE also provides GSAPP and other Rutgers students with invaluable practical experience and helps address a statewide staffing shortage in the educational system. SHARE demonstrates how GSAPP's work can have truly meaningful impact on our local community, ensuring delivery of high-quality services to children with autism in districts typically facing barriers to that access.

#### Training in Autism and ABA

A key part of our mission is to train the next generation of professionals pursuing in-demand careers that support individuals on the autism spectrum. The DDDC provides intensive training in applied behavior analysis (ABA) to Rutgers master's and doctoral level students. Each year, the DDDC also offers training to practitioners in other disciplines, such as nursing and undergraduate fieldwork students, psychiatry fellows, and family practice residents. Additionally, DDDC trainees often have the opportunity to participate in groundbreaking research projects and industry events. This year, we had the honor of hosting and training international professionals from South Korea.

The DDDC's work was recognized as a key factor in Rutgers University-New Brunswick being awarded the *Innovation and Economic Prosperity* designation.




